"Located at the far end of the tenancy, in an area with low natural light, the staff breakout creates a totally different feel to the rest of the office, providing staff with a break in the true sense of the word. Bold colours are repeated in the design of the kitchen storage, island bench and feature ceiling, creating a feeling of energy. Feature splash back lighting creates a feeling of depth while mid grey horizontal surfaces help to reduce the repeated cleaning normally required.

Further interest has been created by the use of bright white bar stools, stainless steel fittings and inexpensive clear glass pendant lighting. The repeated gyprock partition cut-out helps to define the space and this creates a space that remains connected to the general working area while still maintaining a degree of privacy."

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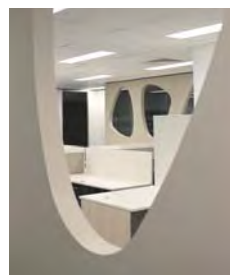
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"In addition to gyprock partition cut-outs, frosted film and coloured graphics help to create intermittent privacy and vision while breaking up large expanses of existing blue carpet. Meeting rooms all have views to general areas while other existing building aspects were disguised to create a seamless contemporary working environment.

Taking advantage of the street frontage natural light, the open plan fit-out was carefully designed to sustainably minimise the addition of extra lighting within the open area, whilst still meeting the clients brief and creating a workable environment.



Careful consideration in the early stages of designing allowed local products and sustainable materials to be sourced, taking into account their future impacts. This produced a sustainable tenancy fit-out where possible, while still creating a design that did not compromise the needs and wants of the client.

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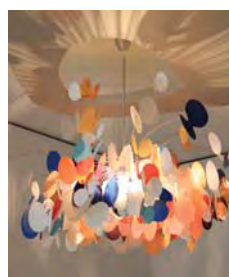
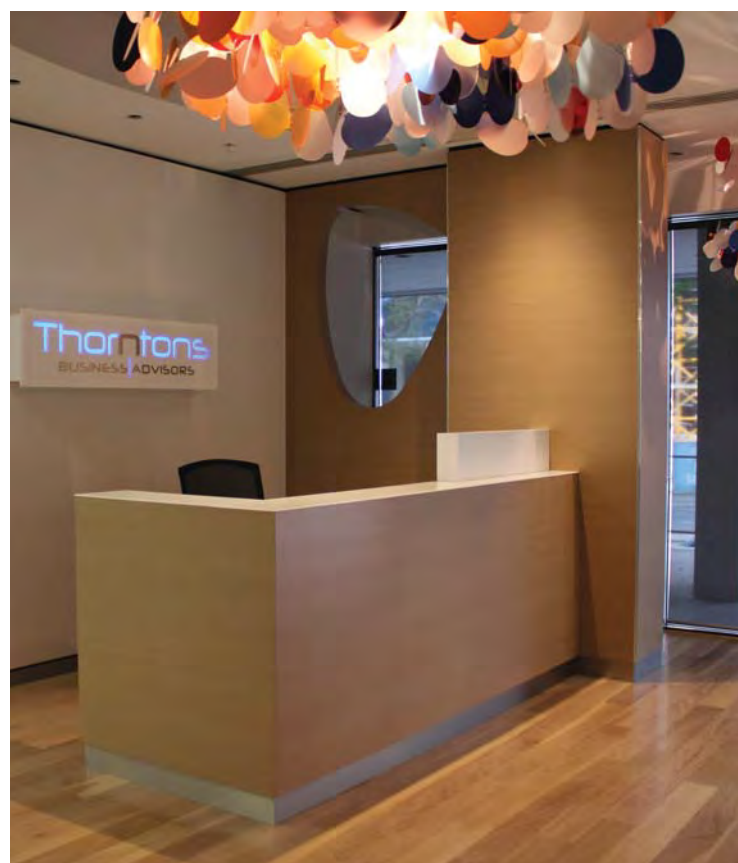
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"The reception area features blonde timber veneer for the counter, feature wall and timber floor; laying the foundations to a clean, welcoming and relaxed space.

Warm ambient lighting is emitted from the organically shaped bulkheads and a Marc Pascal custom made pendant introduces splashes of colour to the otherwise neutral space.

These colours provide a link to the client's new corporate colours and form an introduction to the overall scheme of the tenancy; beginning at reception, flowing through the calming workstation area and ending at the vibrant staff breakout area."

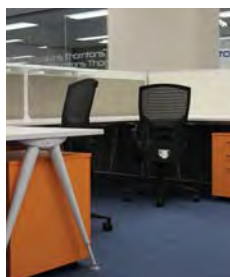
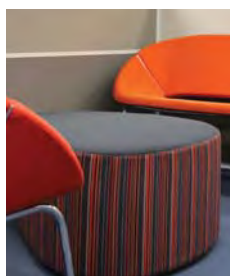
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"After time spent in a segregated full height office environment, our client sought to unify the work team and facilitate interaction between staff. Partners and managers were positioned around the perimeter to maintain a degree of privacy while general workstations were clustered into working teams in the core of the tenancy. Natural light and views to the outside environment were an important factor, achieved by using a low height screen system and cutting feature shapes through full height gyprock walls in the passageways.

Custom designed cabinets divide the perimeter workstations while 'off the shelf' steel tambour storage units were specified in the core. The calm ambience of these areas has been highlighted using splashes of feature colours on the mobile pedestals and seating components."
